The Urban Ag Internship Program

CLBL's Urban Agriculture Internship (UAI) is a year-long paid internship in which Sacramento high school students gain skills and experience in sustainable agriculture, workplace readiness, and individualized self-development. Through the synthesis of weekly work hours in school gardens, field trips to local ag lands and natural resource sites, student leadership roles, and weekly workforce development learning, interns have the opportunity to explore a variety of careers, make influential industry connections, develop a host of professional and holistic life skills, and understand what it means to farm for the health of people and the environment. We are currently working with 20-25 interns from Grant Union and Luther Burbank High Schools. Through a secondary piece of the program, we also offer 120-150 students participating in Grant Union and Luther Burbank's Agriculture and Environmental Science Academies with supplemental workforce development training in the form of job preparation workshops, industry guest speakers, career panels, and field trips.

Core Responsibilities

Program Development:

- Assist in overseeing weekly intern work hours at Grant Union and Luther Burbank.
- Collaborate with Program Manager to create and deliver workforce development, leadership development, social/emotional learning, and experiential learning curriculum throughout the calendar year to intern cohorts.
- Collaborate with Program Manager to create and deliver workforce development curriculum to Academy students throughout the school year.
- Assist in coordinating guest speakers, career panels, and field trip opportunities for intern cohorts and Academy students.
- Assist in maintaining an effective communication system with all students, teachers, and industry partners.
- Perform intern payroll duties and assist Program Manager in performing all other administrative duties for intern supervision including, but not limited to, intern recruitment and orientation, onboarding, completing required forms, and offboarding.

Organizational Engagement:

- Participate in UAI and Youth Programs team meetings.
- Participate in at least one organizational working group.
- Participate in organization-wide events as needed.
- Engage in specific cross-training related to other CLBL Youth Programs (FARMS, CFW, SLEWS).

Qualifications & Experience

Minimum Qualifications:

- Demonstrates commitment to valuing diversity and engaging individuals and communities across cultural and racial boundaries.
- Belief in and commitment to CLBL's mission and work.

Preferred Qualifications:

- Associates degree or equivalent work experience in agriculture, education, environmental science or related fields.
- Minimum of 2 years of experience working with youth in informal (camp, program) or formal (classroom) settings, including experience developing and delivering lesson plans.
- Confidence in teaching and managing groups of students in various settings with empathy and cultural competence.
- Previous experience in program coordination or management: communication, meeting facilitation, agenda planning, record maintenance, reporting, community outreach, and partner relationships.
- Proven writing skills, detail-orientation, and ability to communicate effectively.
- Ability and willingness to work with diverse students, partners, and stakeholders.
- Willingness to work as a collaborative team and engage in reflective feedback.
- Ability to work in the field (lifting, planting, hiking, etc.).
- Strong preference for individuals currently living in the Sacramento region.
- Strong preference for individuals who are bilingual, especially in Spanish or Hmong.

Expectations

This position is hybrid, split between working at Sacramento schools, CLBL Headquarters, and remotely. After initial training, 1-2 days a week in the office are required.

Hours, Benefits & Compensation

This is a 40 hour/week non-exempt position. Occasional evenings and weekends will be necessary. Range from \$26-\$30/hour, commensurate with experience. This position includes medical, vision, and dental benefits, vacation, sick days and 12 paid holidays after 3 months of employment. CLBL also provides the opportunity to enroll in Flexible Health Spending Accounts, supplemental insurance through Colonial Insurance, and 401(K)/Roth IRA options.
